Nevertheless, the problems that surround us change continuously and we must be prepared for these transformations in order to carry out the best solutions. That is why, last year, the Board of Directors took time to reflect on the road traveled, the present and future of FECHAC. From this planning exercise, we obtained an important conclusion: we must focus even more on people's development and, in order to achieve this, we will work with the assets of each community -what they have, what they know how to do, what they are proud of-. We are sure this will allow us to advance faster, all together, towards a healthy, equitable and impartial society.

# Building Community?

When a group of people get together and organize to work towards a common goal, they are building community.

When a group of organizations unite to reach a goal that benefits society, they are building community.

When the government works side by side with non-profit organizations or any other institutions towards social welfare, they are building community.

Every time FECHAC invests in a project or program, working side by side with organizations, the government or those that will be benefited, we are building community, offering spaces and motivating the creation of groups or work networks throughout the State.

Why is it so important to build community? Because creating better opportunities for human and social development for all Chihuahuans, is a goal that will only be met if we all work together: you and I, your family and mine.

That is why, here at FECHAC, we thrive so that every day more people and organizations of the three areas join efforts, assuming the roles demanded by the present, favoring the need for a fair and harmonious development of our society and becoming responsible of our own destiny.



## What is FECHAC?

FECHAC is an organization created by Chihuahuans in order to bring the opportunities for a better life closer to those in most need in our State.

In 1990 a natural disaster moved the community. Hand in hand, Chihuahuans worked to rebuild the areas that had been affected by a downpour. As business owners, we took this opportunity to give something to our community, so we asked the government to establish an extraordinary tax that would allow us to contribute funds that would be used to help the victims of this disaster, petition that was accepted issuing a decree which had one year duration. Distribution of resources was supervised by a group of business owners that also had to analyze each case that came up.

After this experience and closer than we had ever been to those most in need, in 1994 we again asked for the opportunity of contributing. We wanted to continue helping those in most need, not only in Chihuahua City, but throughout the State. Once again, the State government backed this initiative and issued a new decree that has been renewed twice since then, thanks to goodwill of business owners, local Congress and State Government.

In 2006, we will once again look to renew this alliance that is an example of shared social responsibility throughout Mexico and the rest of the world.

## How do we help?

We are a second floor institution. This means we back other institutions dedicated to tending to the different needs of Chihuahuans that because of their age, social status, health or other factors that affect their development, live in marginal conditions.

For example, we back the construction, reconstruction and furnishing of schools, hospitals, clinics, shelters, asylums, crisis and family centers. We also foster pro-

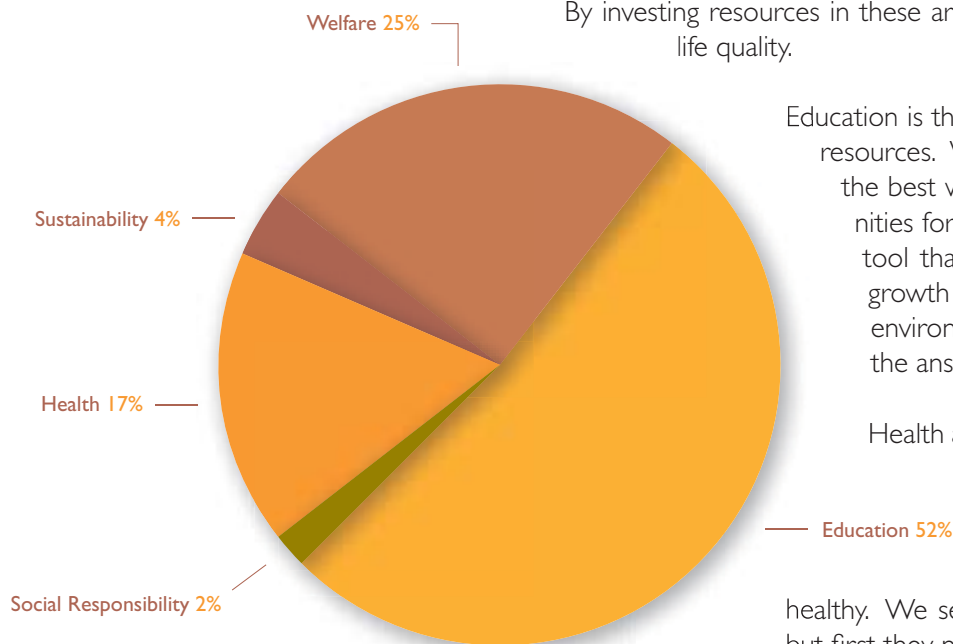
grams that strengthen organizations whose mission is to serve others, as well as education programs for life and work.

To guarantee transparency and the good use of resources, we make sure, through a severe application process, that benefits really reach those that need them the most. This includes visits, evaluation of the project's viability and examination of documents that prove its legality and show the work done by the petitioning organization, amongst others.

## Priority areas.

We know there is a great diversity of social challenges. For our support to be effective, we made different investigations that determined the areas in which we must focus as we begin "reconstructing" the community: education, health and well-being, sustainability and development of social responsibility. By investing resources in these areas, we have a real impact in people's life quality.

### Investment per area attended.



Education is the area in which we invest most of our resources. We do so, because we are sure this is the best way to give people the most opportunities for self development. Education is a vital tool that allows us personal and professional growth and gives us a wider spectrum of our environment, which therefore allows us to find the answers to our problems.

Health and wellbeing is the second investment area for obvious reasons: we want and need healthy Chihuahuans. It is not possible to study, work or care for your family if you are not healthy. We seek for Chihuahuans personal growth, but first they need well-being.

Even if you have health and education, it is very competitive out there...but there are always opportunities to get ahead in life. All you need is a good idea and the will to work. That is why our third priority area is sustainability.

Social responsibility is a very important area, because we are sure that in the extent that people participates, in one way or another, to help solve the problems that affect us all and stop just being residents to become responsible citizens, in that same extent, our society will be a better one.

## Investment.

With resources from 38,000 Chihuahuan business owners, during 2004 we made an investment of USD\$ 5'049,947 to support 93 projects throughout the State of Chihuahua. This amount represents only what FECHAC contributed with, not counting our allies contributions in each approved project, which means that this amount is at least twice that of our own investment.

Administrative and promotion expenses of the Foundation are only 8% which means that 92 cents out of every dollar reach the beneficiaries. Having a program for moving additional resources, which in 2004 represented 9.95% of those generated by the decree, means that the contributions made by business owners are reaching the beneficiaries intact.

The year 2004 was transcendental in the history of FECHAC as we began an ambitious project that will guarantee long term sustainability of our organization: the creation of an endowment. With the support of board members and friends, we started a special fund called "Founder's Legacy", which in a few years will be a financial support that will cover our operation expenses. This way, in the future, every dollar contributed by new donors will be invested in its entirety in social causes. This project is backed by the Centro Mexicano para la Filantropía (Mexican Center for Philanthropy) and the Fundación Inter-Americana (Inter-American Foundation).

## Our programs.

FECHAC gives its support through other non-profit organizations, but there are certain areas we consider fundamental and that were not being tended to by any institution in particular. That is why we carry out some programs, which later on are “de-incorporated” and work independently.

On the other hand, with a clear conviction on the importance of joint efforts, we foster the creation of round-table discussions in which different institutions have the opportunity to coordinate their efforts to optimize resources and maximize benefits for the community. From these processes, several “Triple I” programs have emerged, such as for senior citizens, indigenous groups, HIV/Aids and values. They receive this name because they are inter-institutional, inter-sector and integral.

## FECHAC Programs.

### Productive Development.

In order to help families get better incomes and, therefore, have a better life quality, we created the productive development programs. Through them, we make it possible for the beneficiaries to have the opportunity to create their own business and increase their family income.

Thanks to the trust deposited in us by institutions such as FIRA-Banco de México (FIRA-Bank of Mexico) and the Secretaría de Economía (Secretariat of Economy), we have credit lines that allow us to help more families.

### Main achievements in 2004

- **2,391 low-income families** benefited from financing given to establish or grow their small businesses.
- We backed **181 small manufacturers** with credits and training to make their micro-businesses stronger.
- We granted **USD\$1'331,581.56** in credits.
- We held **15 courses and workshops**, where we trained **300 micro-business owners**.

## Corporate Social Responsibility.

*Businesses depend on the health, stability and prosperity of the communities where they operate.*

With this vision, in 2003 we began this program, offering Chihuahuan businesses guidance and the tools needed to develop social responsibility, which, together with their business strategies, will improve their competitiveness and their opportunities of permanency, so that in the long run they will be a source of economic and social wealth for the community.

### Main achievements in 2004

- About **40 local businesses** have participated in different workshops that examine Social Responsibility issues, such as: Ethic codes, Commitment with the community, Life quality at the workplace and Rational use of resources, amongst others.
- 14 national and transnational businesses have shared their experiences and the way they have incorporated CSR practices in their daily work and the benefits this has generated.
- As a complement, together with the UACH (Chihuahua State University), we had a case study on **“Good business practices”** at 17 local businesses.

## Community Strengthening Centers In Chihuahua and Juarez

They are the result of an alliance between FECHAC and the Tecnológico de Monterrey (a local university), with the purpose of fostering a stronger, organized



and connected society. Their mission is to create a better society by strengthening the development of non-profit organizations, promoting and backing the creation of social networks and strategic alliances, and prompting volunteer work.

### Main achievements in 2004

- **132 new organizations** became affiliated.
- **28 courses and workshops** had place, on subjects such as administration, getting resources, communication and transparency, strategic programming, amongst others.
- Both Chihuahua and Juarez were sites for a **Professionalizing Course**, prompted by INDESOL.
- We prompted and backed the creation and strengthening of **6 social networks**.
- We backed **69 NGO's** on their strategic planning and different consultations.
- We attained **alliances with 8 institutions**: SEDESOL, INDESOL, Patrimonio de la Beneficencia Pública, Fundación, Murrieta, Association of Fundraising Professionals, Fundación Paso del Norte, A. C., Community Resource Center and General Consulate of the United States.

There are certain areas we consider fundamental and that were not being tended to by any institution in particular. That is why we carry out some programs, which later on are “de-incorporated”.

## TRIPLE “I” PROGRAMS.

### PRODIA: Integral development for senior citizens program.

It was created to impulse, within the community, the culture of respecting and caring for senior citizens, in order to contribute to a better lifestyle of the elderly living in the State of Chihuahua.

Together with many institutions, we have fostered an increasing interest in aging, by training professionals in care of the elderly; the creation of presswork that promote self-care and inform about the services and rights of senior citizens; a permanent program to instill values such as respect, solidarity and tolerance, aimed at children in grade school throughout the State.

#### Main achievements in 2004

- Together with the UACH, we **trained 38 professionals** in 8 different areas, who got a diploma on Clinical and Social Gerontology, in order to give specialized care to our senior citizens.
- For the fourth year in a row, Paso del Norte Health Foundation financed the program “Hacia una vejez deseable y exitosa” (towards a desired and successful old age) in Ciudad Juarez, training 32 people that promote self-care in group sessions with **385 senior citizens**. Also, as part of this project, for the fourth year in a row, we held the get-together for senior citizens, with a quorum of **1,350 people**.
- We held, for the third time, the **project “Knowing your grandparents”**, together with the Secretariat of Education and Culture. Ten thousand teachers and eighty thousand 3rd grade students from around the State participated in this project that promotes respecting senior citizens.

### PEEPSIDA: AIDS Prevention Educational Program of the State of Chihuahua.

Since AIDS is considered the pandemic disease of the century, it is imperative to make a great effort on preventing it. That is why we established an alliance with the Secretariat of Education and Culture and Fatima I.B.P., with the teachers unions and the governmental entities that have to do with this, in order to integrate into the formal academic system a program oriented towards youngsters that instills prevention of HIV/AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases.

#### Main achievements in 2004

- **221 teachers** trained on educational strategies about HIV/AIDS.
- **188 teachers**, junior and high school, trained on human development.
- **60 users** trained at the Instituto Chihuahuense de Educación para los Adultos (Chihuahuan Institute for the Education of Adults).
- **261 adults** participated in **8 sensitizing conferences**.
- **808 youngsters** participated in 2 workshops, 3 conferences and a sensitizing gathering.
- Evaluation of **118 teachers and 1,387 students** from 45 schools.
- **147 headmasters** sensitized.
- **Incorporation** of the PEEPSIDA workshop into PRONAP (official training entity of the Secretariat of Public Education), as a course to be given state-wide.

## **PIAI: Inter-institutional Program on Caring for the Indigenous**

Historically, important efforts have been made to tend to the needs of the indigenous groups. Seven years ago, different entities related to the indigenous, were convoked to work together through round-table discussions. And PIAI was born with the goal of aiding indigenous groups in the State of Chihuahua achieve well-being within their culture.

Since then, over 60 private and public institutions have used this space to share experiences and optimize resources. This

process has originated the creation of other round-tables, specializing in justice and human rights, natural resources and education, which in 2004 generated some inter-institutional projects, such as training public ministers and public appointed defense lawyers on indigenous justice, and a forum on the challenges of inter-cultural education, together with the programs that each institution supports.

## Chihuahua 2020 Values

Throughout our State, there are different initiatives to promote values. Unfortunately, these efforts are dispersed, which reduces their effectiveness. In 2003, together with the City of Chihuahua, we promoted the creation of the program “Chihuahua 2020 Values” so that social activists could coordinate their individual actions and promote values, therefore generating a bigger impact in the community, with a vision towards the year 2020.

### Main achievements in 2004

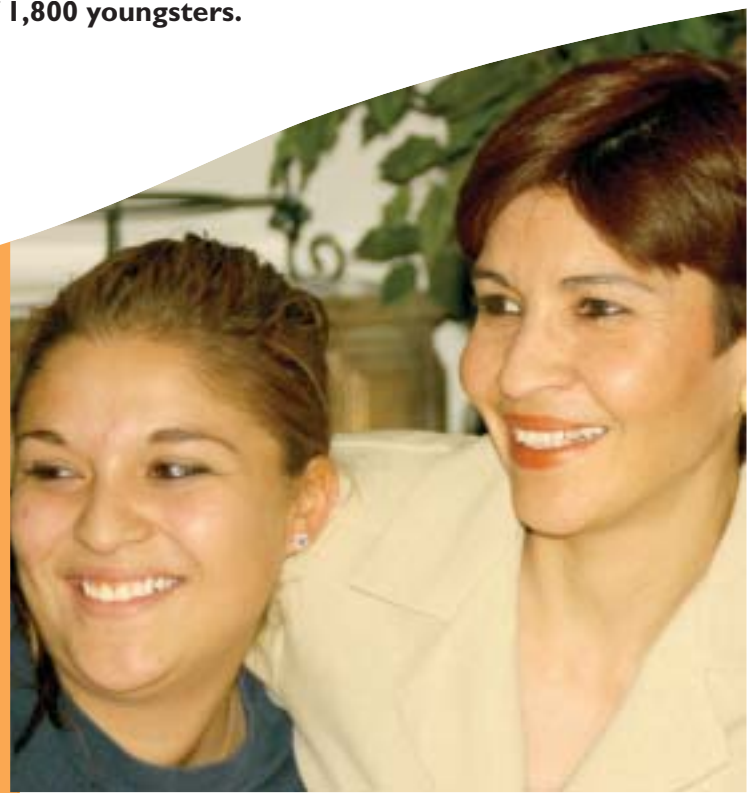
- Active participation of **52 organizations** that work coordinately, and, therefore, the programs on values have reached the community a lot stronger.

- We promoted the **statewide campaign** “Sólo tú puedes hacer que los valores se vivan” (only you can make values come alive) and we sent positive messages through TV, radio and newspapers, in order to help people recognize values and be conscious that we can all contribute so that we live with values.
- We organized the Congress on Education, where over **1,000 teachers** participated, were motivated and learned new ways on educating on values. As a result of this, new activities will be undertaken so that students can recognize, live and act with values.
- There was also a Congress on Values, with the participation of **1,800 youngsters**.

## DE-INCORPORATED PROGRAMS.

### “Onéami” School for Parents.

Since 1996 we have promoted this program that offers 8 different, to help parents raise their children bring up valuable people, using a teaching model for human and value development, in order to have better life quality in our communities.

In 2003, Onéami started to be operated independently in eight cities of our State.

#### Main achievements in 2004

- **6,439** parents graduated in this year from workshops on:
  - ECCA methodology
  - Preventing addictions
  - Preventing violence
  - Optimism
  - Personal growth
- Information events on family and values
- Activities on tending to and strengthening of families, such as: family therapies, counseling, channeling cases, and more.

### CEDAIN: Bartering Centers.

At the PIAI round-table discussions the need to take action in helping thwart poverty and lack of work opportunities of the indigenous people arose, so we looked at the possibility of starting a project consisting on “bartering centers” in certain communities in the Sierra Tarahumara, in order to help indigenous families obtain basic products in exchange for their handcrafts.

The “Centro de Desarrollo Alternativo Indígena, A.C.” or “CEDAIN” (Alternative Development Center for the Indigenous)

was created to operate the bartering centers, in order to offer indigenous communities an alternative, in accordance with their customs, in acquiring the basic items needed for their wellbeing.

#### Main achievements in 2004

- **6,300 Rarámuri families** have exchanged their handcrafts at the “bartering centers”.
- In this year alone, basic products for USD\$ 51,487.82 were distributed, which means **better food and nutrition** for the Rarámuri families that take part in this program, with 52% of them being under 12.
- The establishment of **66 family vegetable gardens**, benefiting 250 Tarahumaras, training them on how to grow greens and vegetables apt for their areas, and, therefore, giving them a permanent food source.
- The creation of a sotol nursery with approximately 500 plants that will be used to manufacture more handcrafts. By having raw material near their communities, we make sure that craftsmanship will continue being an income source for these families.

## Non-Profit Organizations State Conference

Non-profit organizations devote themselves every day to taking care of their beneficiaries. This doesn't allow them to pay proper attention to institutional strengthening, fundamental in long term sustainability. That is why, since 1998, developing NGO's abilities is of the utmost importance to FECHAC. We know we are making a long-term investment, but we are sure it is worth it.

Five years ago, we incorporated to our annual strengthening program the Non-profit Organizations State Conference, the only one of its kind, where staff and volunteers get together, hear about success stories, get information about new tendencies and reflect about the meaning of the work they do.

This event reunites yearly renowned scholars, trainees and philosophers that share their knowledge and experiences with the organizations in our State.

On November 2004 we invited sector leaders to deliberate over an important subject: Is it an obligation or an alternative to show the results of our philanthropic work? To do so, we invited and counted with approximately 400 people from NGO's Statewide, who, through activities, conferences, round-table discussions and reading material, now have more tools to reach the goals that their beneficiaries –and society– expect from them.

Once again, we thank our sponsors and partners for their support, as well as the grand speakers that attended, for making this a successful Conference.

This event reunites yearly renowned scholars, trainees and philosophers that share their knowledge and experiences with the organizations in our State.





## “Sharing” Committee.

The work done by FECHAC is an important factor in reaching our institutional mission. This work has given us great satisfactions, but it has also made us more aware of the social problematic that affects our community. It would be impossible not to be conscious of our responsibility as human beings towards those that have very little and incongruous if we wouldn't do anything to alleviate this situation.

Trying to find a way to contribute with society, we decided to donate 1% of our salary every month to attend urgent cases related with health and education.

The Sharing Committee is font by FECHAC's own employees, whom after a conscientious analysis authorized which cases can be supported. This way we contribute, for example, to save a hemophilic baby's life by buying the medications needed

or to help a 73 year old person walk again, amongst many other urgent cases.

During 2004, we invited other activists from our community –businesses, NGO's and Government branches- to join this initiative, collecting USD\$18,168 and helping in 20 cases.

You too can do something for others. Find out what happens in your community and help those that live in poverty in whatever way you can. We invite you to see for yourself how you can change your life, and that of others, by learning to share.

## A year of accomplishments.

During 2004, three Mexican institutions recognized FECHAC by giving us important awards.

The “Premio Razón de Ser” (Reason of Being Award), given by the Fundación Merced, is a recognition to non-profit organizations that work to improve life conditions for Mexicans and that, as a result of their daily work, compromise and professionalism, offer their beneficiaries complete services that have great social impact. After an elimination process of all kind of NGO’s in the country, we received this award, consisting of money and a sculpture by Architect Pedro Ramírez Vázquez, in June of 2004.

The Premio a la Fundación del Año (Foundation of the Year Award) is given by the Asociación de Profesionales en Procuración de Fondos, Capítulo Cd. de México (Association of Fundraising Professionals, Mexico City Chapter). A judging committee, formed by renowned professional fundraisers in our country, selects the most outstanding Foundation due to

their achievements and grants them this award during the annual meeting at the International Philanthropy Week.

The accreditation of Institutionalization and Transparency awarded by the Mexican Center for Philanthropy (Institucionalidad y Transparencia por el Centro Mexicano para la Filantropía) is the result of a joint effort of professionals that implies complying precisely with the 43 pointers of institutionalization.

Being recognized by others represents a great challenge for FECHAC. Not only we have to maintain our level of institutionalization, but now are obliged to surpass it. We are working on it.

## Alliances with our government.

Even though the main concern of the government is obtaining better life conditions for the people, this should be everybody's job. Every day, the Federal, State and Local governments are more open to work hand in hand with the community. Our authorities are firm believers in the community participating to achieve real changes and that is why they have prompted this collaboration by convoking to round-table discussions and work forums that look forward to include everybody, listen to our proposals and invest in them, uniting efforts as we reach for common good.

FECHAC has been invited, by the different levels of government, to participate with other institutions in organizations created so different voices could be heard before making decisions on topics that worry society. One or several representatives from our Foundation have been invited to share their experience and knowledge at the following committees and consulting councils:

- Municipal Environment Committee - Chihuahua City.
- "See well to learn better" Committee - Secretariat of Education and Culture, State Government of Chihuahua.
- Judging Committee for NGO's – Secretariat of Social Development, State Government of Chihuahua.
- Judging Commission for Social Co-investment Projects – Secretariat of Social Development, Federal Government (SEDESOL).
- Social Regulating Committee for the National Backing

Fund for Solidarity Businesses (FONAES) – Secretariat of Economy, Federal Government.

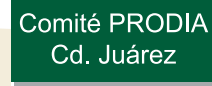
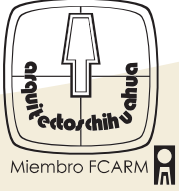
- Social Development and Citizen's Partaking Council– Secretariat of Social Development, State Government.
